Ox Heys Corn Mill in the Sixteenth Century

We have been contacted by a resident in Shelf, Mr Ben Stables, who has written a history book on the Shelf area. There are some sections on parts of Norwood Green, and Ben has kindly agreed to allow us to print these. The articles referring to the village concern the corn mill at Ox Heys and the Brooksbank family of Ox Heys. The following extract is about the corn mill and the second extract will appear in the December newsletter.



Ox Heys Corn Mill in the sixteenth century

Shelf had a "Lords Mill", which was in existence in 1534, 1590 and 1634, where tenants were required to grind their "corn and grain", a lucrative business because the use of hand mills was banned within Manors. This was presumably one of the 20 watermills owned by the Savile family in 1566. Richard Brooksbank also established a corn mill at Ox Heys before 1562. He was able to do this because tenants of St John of Jerusalem lands, such as Ox Heys and other properties in Shelf, did not have to grind their corn at the Lords Mill even after the order of St John of Jerusalem had been dissolved. Hey is an old English word for enclosure so Ox Heys may have originated as a farm for cattle. It was held by the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem, and was later home to the Brooksbank family.

In November 1562, a Court Case at York (at which William Cowper of Dean House and other local men were the arbitrators) decreed that local residents had the right to use the corn mills at Ox Heys, Shibden and Coley - not just the Wakefield Manor Mill at Rastrick. However, in 1600 Richard Waterhouse agreed to prevent passage over his land to the Mill "lately erected by James Brooksbank in Shelf" (it was probably recently re-built since it was likely to have been built of short-lived timber). In 1647, Jeremy Brooksbank leased land measuring 60 yards in length and 20 yards in breadth for building a dam for the Mill. It is not known when the mill ceased to operate, but it seems to have been in operation for around 100 years.

<u>Autumn Recipe</u>

After these months of long sunny days there is quite an abundance of soft fruit around. This crumble is really delicious at any time of year, and it is a very adaptable recipe. Always good with the staples, custard, cream or ice cream. The whisky is optional but it does go well with the apples, and if you have some blackberry whisky handy (who doesn't?) that would be tasty. You can adapt it to whatever fruits and/or flavour you like, such as peaches or apricots and brandy, plum and calvados etc or if you like quince you could try quince, lemon and vanilla with calvados.

Apple & Whisky Crumble

<u>Apples</u> <u>Crumble</u>

2 Kgm cooking apples
2 Tbsp lemon juice
2 Tbsp whisky
50 gm ground almonds
75 gm light muscovado sugar
75 gm sugar (white is best)
A few hazelnuts (optional)

- Heat oven to Gas 4 / 180 C.
- Mix crumble ingredients until sandy, you can do this by hand or use a food processor.
- Mix the water, whisky and lemon juice and add the white sugar.
- Peel and core the apples and dice, then stir into the liquid mix
- Put into a buttered pie dish and scatter the crumble mix over, just put on as much or as little as you like. Optional – you can sprinkle a few chopped hazelnuts on top.
- Bake for 30 minutes until golden and bubbling
- If you like your whisky try serving with 200 ml whipped double cream with 2 Tbs whisky and 2 Tbsp icing sugar added.
